BROAD STREET COMPUTER LAB RECEIVES MAJOR UPGRADES

With the assistance of Northstar New Jersey, the management services company that provides sales and marketing support to the New Jersey Lottery, through a Growth Services Agreement with the New Jersey Department of Treasury, the computer lab on Broad Street got a complete makeover! Volunteers replaced old computers with 14 Dell flat screen computers and added new printers, desks, speakers, headphones, educational software, flooring, lighting, banners, and a fresh coat of paint, totaling \$30,000.

A grand opening and ribbon cutting ceremony was held January 28th with executives from Northstar joining State Senator Shirley Turner, Mercer County Executive Brian Hughes, Sheriff Jack Kemler, Freeholder Andrew Koontz, CYO Board and staff members, and about a dozen students. More than 100 students from 12 Mercer County schools make their way to the CYO on Broad Street every day to participate in arts and crafts classes, play on the outside playground, in the gym, and get homework help through the after school program. "The state lottery has a slogan: 'Give Your Dreams a Chance' and now Northstar is giving a chance for these kids to succeed and do better academically", CYO Executive Director Tom Mladenetz said "We are very pleased to be a beneficiary of their generosity." The old computers in the lab were more than 12 years old which prompted the CYO to apply for a grant. "The transformation of this (computer lab) in our 90-year-old building is truly impressive!" said Mladenetz. "It will serve hundreds of Trenton school students who attend the CYO After School Program and Summer REC Camp....Many of these families do not have computers in their homes. This project sends such a strong, positive message to these young people. It tells them that socially responsible companies want them to have a safe place to succeed." He added that the CYO is blessed to have many partnerships in the public and private sectors, as well as individual donors that help make accomplishments like this possible. Northstar NJ's CEO, Gordon Medenica, shared his gratitude for this opportunity. "Northstar NJ appreciates the help and cooperation we received from local officials, State Legislators, business people and community leaders who share the common goal of bringing computer technology to our students," he said.

Northstar NJ's After School Advantage Program, which began in 1999, is a global community investment program which provides qualifying non-profit community agencies and public schools with state-of-the-art computer labs. These computer centers are designed to provide urban children ages five to 15 with meaningful, yet fun, learning experience during the critical after-school hours, in a safe environment. "By applying our knowledge and expertise to this type of program Northstar NJ hopes to increase children's interests in careers in computers and provide them with the necessary tools to help them become more competitive in school and in today's job market," said Sarah Brennan, Northstars Director of Corporate Affairs. The lab is the first After School Advantage computer lab built by Northstar NJ, which provides sales and marketing support to the New Jersey Lottery, an affiliate of GTECH Corporation, a technology provider. Mladenetz expressed special gratitude to Brennan and Bob Kersey who both did a stellar job in leading the Northstar team.

\$25,000 GRANT RECEIVED FROM MISSION & MINISTRY, INC.

In February, the CYO received a \$25,000 grant for the East State Street Center for its school-age enrichment programs, after school and summer camp from Mission and Ministry, Inc., a ministry of the Daughters of Charity St. Louise Province.

The CYO request was endorsed by Daughter of Charity, Sister Joanne Dress, Executive Director of Catholic Social Services in the Diocese of Trenton and Bishop David M. O'Connell's designee on the CYO Board of Trustees. In her recommendation, Sister Joanne said, "Having affordable childcare allows parents to pursue education/employment to better support their family and help them out of poverty and dependence on the welfare system."

"We are very proud of all our programs, and thrilled that Mission and Ministry, Inc. has made this award," said Tom Mladenetz, CYO Executive Director. "There are many Trenton families who don't qualify for publicly supported childcare programs. Through private partnerships like this one, CYO programs can help all children, regardless of public funding limitations. We thank Mission and Ministry for stepping up and encourage other entities to do likewise."

EAST STATE STREET CENTER RECEIVES NAEYC RE-ACCREDIATION



The East State Street Center Pre-School recently earned re-accreditation from the National Association for the Education of Young Children - the nation's leading organization of early childhood professionals. To earn the re-accreditation, the Pre-School went through an extensive self study process, measuring the program and its' services against 10 NAEYC Early Childhood Program Standards and more than 400 related Accreditation criteria. The program received NAEYC accreditation after an on site visit by NAEYC Assessors to ensure that the program meets each of the 10 program standards. The re-accreditation is good until July 1, 2019, and less than 8% of all pre-schools have the NAEYC stamp of approval. All four of the preschools operated by the CYO are NAEYC accredited!
