CYO PIVOTS TO CONTINUE TO WORK WITH THE COMMUNITY, TURNS A CHALLENGING PERIOD INTO A PRODUCTIVE TIME!

As the world was turned upside down and times changed dramatically, the CYO changed too, adjusting to how we serve the community! For five and a half months our pre-schools, before and after schools, summer camps, athletic programs, and many more important family and community programs and special events, all of which defined the CYO for 68 years, came to an screeching halt.

The CYO pivoted to new ways to serve the community and for those in need. Our Pre-Schools went virtual and we kept the students engaged with face to face computer work. We honored our graduates with drive by salutes and diplomas. Our Bromley Food Pantry surged with scores of new family sign ups, and the Bromley Summer Lunch Program operated for 59 days handing out lunches, and we added an educational healthy eating component distributing fruits and vegetables to the Bromley residents. Our Broad St. and East State St. Center provided daily grab and go lunches for hundreds of people! We found partnerships to feed the hungry, needy and those out of work. Partnerships and Grants included Mercer Street Friends, Arm In Arm, Wawa, Albertson's, and Princeton Area Community Foundation, Trenton YMCA, RWJ Barnabas, Snipes Farm, Bishop Ahr Endowment Fund, FEMA Emergency Fund, Hamilton Township, United Way, and many individuals made generous monetary donations! The CYO was able to bring food security to thousands during the pandemic and relieve some stress to those we served throughout.

When late August rolled around and many needed to get back to work, we decided it was time to safely re-open our Yardville and Ewing Pre-Schools, and offer new programming at Yardville, South Broad St., and East State St. Centers for Remote Leaners when students weren't in school (something we have never done before), following all safety protocols and procedures! Comcast stepped up in this effort and provided free "Lift Zones" to expand our internet access at both of our Trenton Centers. The CYO thanks them and everyone who helped us help the community and re-open!

PROUD TO ANNOUNCE COMPLETION OF NEW YARDVILLE POOL HOUSE!

The CYO is proud to announce the completion of its new Yardville Pool House! The new pool house replaces the small and outdated one built in 1958. The pool house is a two story, 5,000 square foot, handicapped accessible structure that turned out more beautiful than expected! The first floor includes much larger changing areas with several privacy stalls, restroom facilities and showers. The second floor will provide staff restroom, lifeguard locker room, office, and grand space for meetings, year round programming, and additional Day Camp space! There is an outside upper deck area for families to observe children during evening swim lessons, or relaxation time during a group rental. The new pool house will enhance the Day Camp as swimming is a huge part of camp and this new construction allows for an overall better aquatic experience!

CYO EWING RE-OPENS WITH NEW PROTOCOLS

On Monday, August 31, 2020, Ewing CYO Pre-School reopened after being closed since March 16 when the COVID-19 crisis first emerged. We are currently operating with 20 children in two classrooms and 2 staff members in each room. We also have some volunteer assistance from two wonderful ladies from the federal Foster Grandparents Program. They are each assigned exclusively to one classroom and provide assistance with the new daily check in procedure as well as all of the extra cleaning, surface disinfecting and hand washing that must now be done due to the virus.

Our new school year, while different from years past, is shaping up to be a good one. Children and staff have remained healthy due to cooperation between both our center and our families to make sure that all of the health & safety rules associated with COVID 19 are being followed. Our staff is wearing masks all day and the children are wearing masks in the classroom at all times except during rest time and meals. We have also eliminated masks for the children when they are playing outside because we found that the masks would slip around and posed a safety hazard when the children were running.

Check in and check out of the center is a bit different than in years past. Parents may not enter the building and are asked to wait outside the door until a temperature check and health assessment is completed on their child. They are also asked a series of health related questions each day to determine whether the child or the family poses a risk for COVID 19 emerging at our center. Staff members are also subject to the same procedure we are following with the children every day. When parents arrive to pick up their children, each classroom is equipped with a walkie talkie as are the office and whoever is manning the table at the front. When a parent arrives, the classroom will get a call on the walkie talkie and then one of the staff members will bring the child to the front door where a parent/guardian can sign them out for the day.

We held a Virtual Back to School Night on Wednesday, October 13. This consisted of a Zoom meeting where the parents of each class met separately with their child's teachers and then joined together for a short session on policies and procedures from the directors. We have never done this before and are working hard to make sure it helps parents feel comfortable with our program and how it operates.

We are confident that we will be able to keep our center up and running and our children and staff healthy. Still we long for the day when all of this becomes a distant memory and our center can operate normally once again!

CYO RECEIVES PROJECT INNOVATION GRANT
